
Habitat: Coastal lowland grazing marsh Sand Leek is a perennial which is not common in our area. It dies down in early summer.



It looks like grass as it first grows but can easily be identified as soon as the flower heads form.

The flowers are sterile and the plant reproduces by means of bulbils which drop off when the plant starts to wilt.

The very dry spring meant that it shrivelled very quickly. It would be good to find some more sites.
